- Gain an understanding of Idaho's Good Samaritan Law.
- Learn where to access naloxone, other overdose prevention tools, and recovery support services.
- Receive a certificate of attendance.



Free opioid overdose rescue supplies are distributed to eligible organizations in Idaho that actively treat or serve individuals at high risk for an overdose. These resources in addition to education and training provide organizational and staff support to appropriately respond to an overdose.
